Be Ready: Flood Safety Tips

Flooding can happen with little warning and cause significant disruptions on college campuses. It's important for students, faculty, and staff to be prepared to ensure everyone's safety.

Before a Flood: Prepare and Stay Informed

1. Know Your Campus Flood Risk:

- Be aware of whether your location is in a flood-prone area.
- campus evacuation routes and flood-prone areas such as basements, underground parking garages, and low-lying buildings on campus.



2. Sign Up for Campus Alerts:

 Make sure all of contact information is updated in your Panther Portal to receive notifications about weather warnings and safety instructions from CAU Public Safety.

3. Create a Personal Emergency Plan:

- o Plan where you would go if you needed to evacuate campus housing or a classroom building.
- o Make sure you have a way to communicate with friends, family, and roommates.

4. Prepare an Emergency Kit:

- o For students: Keep a small emergency kit in your dorm or apartment with water, snacks, first aid supplies, a flashlight, and essential medications.
- For faculty and staff: Consider having a portable kit in your office with similar essentials, along with important documents.

5. Know the Difference Between Watch and Warning:

- **Flood Watch**: Conditions are favorable for flooding. Stay alert and be ready to move to higher ground.
- **Flood Warning**: Flooding is imminent or already occurring. Move to safety immediately.

During a Flood: Take Immediate Action

1. Move to Higher Ground:

- o If you're in a classroom, dorm, or any CAU campus building when a flood warning is issued, head to higher floors or designated safe areas.
- o Avoid using elevators as they can malfunction during flooding.

2. Follow Campus Evacuation Orders:

o If campus officials issue an evacuation order, follow the designated evacuation routes. Don't delay—act quickly to avoid becoming trapped by rising water.

3. Avoid Floodwaters:

- Do not walk, wade, or drive through flooded areas on campus. Even a few inches of moving water can be dangerous.
- Stay clear of areas like parking garages, outdoor stairwells, or sports fields that may flood quickly.

4. Shelter in Place If Necessary:

o If you cannot evacuate, find the highest safe point in the building and wait for emergency services to arrive. Stay away from windows and exterior doors.

5. Stay Informed:

 Keep monitoring your phone, CAU campus alerts, or local news for updates on the flooding situation.

After a Flood: Stay Safe on Campus

1. Wait for Official Instructions:

o Do not return to dorms, classrooms, or offices until CAU Public Safety say it's safe to do so. Flooded areas may still pose hazards.

2. Be Aware of Health Risks:

- Avoid contact with floodwater, which may contain harmful bacteria, chemicals, or debris.
- o Clean and disinfect any belongings that have come into contact with floodwater.

3. Check for CAU Campus Damage:

- o Be cautious when returning to CAU buildings or dormitories. Flooding can cause structural damage, mold growth, or electrical hazards.
- o Report any damage or unsafe conditions to CAU Public Safety.

4. Document Damage:

o If your personal belongings have been damaged in the flood, take photos and report to campus housing.
